This piece was composed for 'The Melodica Quartet'. Its composition began early in 2007 and was finished later that same year. My personal experience playing in this ensemble gave me significant insight into the limitations and possibilities of writing for these instruments. Ideally, for future performances, the melodicas should all be the same or a similar model. Performers should familiarize themselves with the type of model seen below (or a very similar instrument). Also in addition to some theatrical devices there are quite a few unusual techniques employed in this piece, so please see the next page for a detailed description of all the various playing techniques used in this composition. The range of the melodicas used in this piece is from F3 to F6 (F3, being a 5th below middle C).


It should also be noted, that I wanted this composition to be performed by musicians with an intermediate (or higher) level of keyboard proficiency. However, please note that the first melodica in this quartet is the exception to this, and this part is more demanding in comparison to the others. This person will also have to conduct the ensemble as well.



Glossary of techniques for verrière de vapeur


* Tremolo button:

The tremolo button is located on the right hand side of the instrument and when it is repeatedly and rapidly depressed a simple tremolo is produced. This effect is written as so:





* Hose Scratch:

This technique is self explanatory and it is written as follows:




* Key Glissando:

There are extremes of dynamics in this piece and one way in which this is realized is through the use of quiet key glissandos on either the black or white keys of the instrument. This effect could be made louder if need be by using a guitar pick or a similar object to make the sound louder.




* The Over-Blown Harmonic:

As an ensemble we discovered that by gently depressing the highest note (it also works with some of the other high notes) on the instrument and then over-blowing — the sounding result is that a very high and quiet harmonic of this note is produced. This affect is written in the score as follows:



* The Tremolo Button used as an Air Button:

A variation with the tremolo button is that it can be used to allow air and not pitched sound to be heard coming through the instrument. This effect is written in the score in the following manner:



* V.S. (dramatic page turns)

Employment of the term V.S. is used in this piece only when a dramatic page turn is required. This action will stall the motion of the piece, however these dramatic page turns will be done by each performer as they occur in the score. Extra pages will have to be photocopied in order to prepare this effect. Please note this effect is required once with page five and 10 times with page six...if the score is not prepared in such a way it should be done so for the performance.

* General: Please note that the three following techniques, hose scratch, key glissando, and the overblown harmonic are all generally quiet in nature. Despite any dynamic marking in this version of the score that contradicts this, for the most part these techniques should not be played too quietly and should be articulated loudly enough so they can be heard by the audience.

The Big Score

Future performers could interpret this in a variety of ways, but let's just say that the score should be theatrically large while still being practical for all performers to play from. For the first performance there were two page turners. One turning the oversized pages while the other page turner was behind the big score and was turning pages in tandem with the other page turner, however, his score was amplified allowing the sound of each page turn to be audible. Creating a score similar or better to this would be ideal for future performances.



The Movie

The pilfered movie was an assemblage of exquisite scenes from Sergio Leone's movie, "Once Upon a Time in the West". All the scenes were shown in varying degrees of slow-motion and members of "The Melodica Quartet" edited these scenes into an engaging, albeit somewhat illegal, narrative that corresponded with the music in an irreverent, comical, absurd, haunting and beautiful manner. The piece was first performed on the 11th of February in Den Haag (NL) at the Korzo theatre to a very receptive audience.

We used a few tricks to make everything work to the film. It would be easier to describe these to people who are actually serious about performing the piece.

Although, the composer (me) is also open to performances of this piece without all the theatrics I have so far outlined, there should just be some mention of the varying ways in which the piece can be performed.






