There can't be many clubs that have been to Wembley four times in twenty-four months and there can't be many, indeed there can't be any office staffs that have handled so many tickets bearing the magic legend "Football League Cup Final."

Paul White and myself, along with Ian White and Chas. Ralph spent a few hours between us devising a method of selling and how we could best cope with the queues.

At the end of the first day of sales we were all very tired but happy in the knowledge that we had served our stand season ticket holders with a minimum of fuss and maximum speed. Sixteen selling points were made available and we took more money in a few hours than we took in season ticket sales four years ago — such is progress — or is it inflation?

As we were nearing the end of an exhausting day the message came through to the ticket office that the Vice-Chairman was on the 'phone. Paul took the call and returned with the news that several people had apparently rung Mr. Reacher's house to tell him how well they thought the selling had gone.

We would like to thank those persons for their sentiments and also Mr. Reacher for taking the trouble to convey them to us. You have no idea how much those few words meant to us, when we realised that supporters had appreciated our efforts and had not taken them for granted. My thanks to all the ticket staff for the patience they displayed in handling and recording the numbers of all those tickets.

But, you know, the credit was not all due to the people on our side of the counter, a great deal of it must go to our supporters who queued patiently, in good humour and who, in the great majority of cases, had their vouchers already

completed by the time they arrived at the windows which speeded up the selling tremendously.

Of course you can't please everyone, can you? One member couldn't understand why we didn't sell them on the Saturday when we were playing Manchester City. He obviously didn't appreciate the enormity of the task nor did he think about it conflicting with the sale of the Dynamo Berlin tickets.

One supporter went even further and wanted to know why his ticket couldn't have been sold to him at the turnstile when he came to the City game and one lady expressed complete disgust at the whole selling arrangements, but didn't say what had upset her and didn't suggest any alternative. We thought we had done a good job but it seems you can't win them all.

Looking forward to the big day you can forget all about lucky dressing rooms and all that guff because we have been to Wembley four times now, used both dressing rooms, our supporters have stood

For the benefit of Mr. Whalley and his friends here is the explanatory F.A. Rule 26.

(d) **Distribution of tickets** — All Rounds preceding semi-finals.

In all Cup ties except the semi-final and final ties, the visiting club shall have the right to claim 25 per cent. of all seating accommodation, subject to the following regulations:

(i) The request for tickets shall be made within three days of the draw.

(ii) The tickets allotted to the visiting club, if numbered and reserved, must be of equal value to those retained by the home club.

(iii) In cases of replayed ties, the visiting club must make a request for tickets immediately after the drawn game.

What I'd like to point out to the "Daily Mirror" is that I object very strongly to a Back Page Lead story — concerning a particular aspect of my job — without a semblance of truth attached to it.

I was absolutely staggered when I read the article because we have no link up with the company concerned

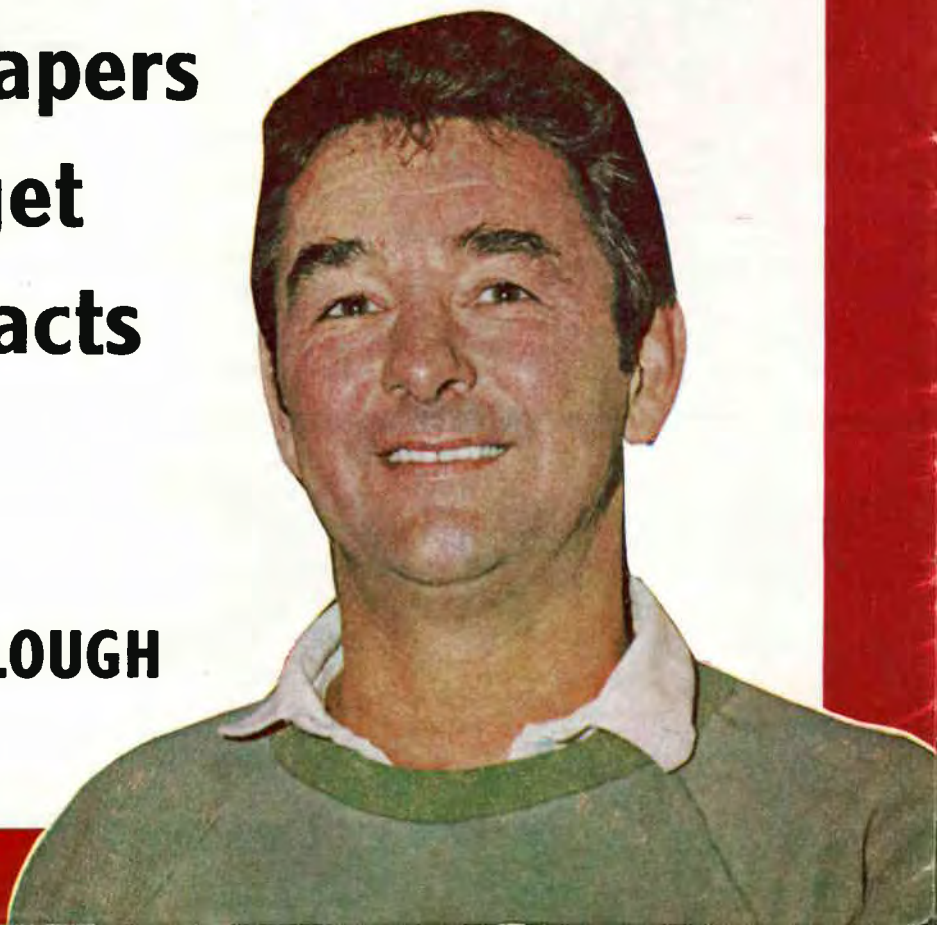
nor are likely to have one to the best of my knowledge.

So when a newspaper goes broadcasting to the nation about "first news of another Admiral coup at Old Trafford, Forest and Spurs" I suggest they get their facts right before going into print.

I find it absolutely amazing that I, as a manager of a football club, can pick up a paper and read matters about my club's affairs and then put it down, knowing that there is not a fragment of truth in it.

I remember the writer of the article Kevin Moseley having something to say in his weekly column about Forest's hospitality — or alleged lack of it — to England manager Ron Greenwood some two years ago.

That was totally inaccurate also! So inaccurate, in fact, that Mr. Greenwood took the trouble to write to us to apologise for any embarrassment it might have caused us. Extracts from Mr. Moseley's article were printed in the "Forest Review" on 4th February 1978 along with a letter from Ron Greenwood.

After reading the story about the Admiral strip I just had to try and contact this Kevin Moseley to find out where he got his facts from.

So I put a call into the "Daily Mirror" sports desk and was told by the deputy sports editor that he wasn't in the office but that he would contact him at home for me.

It was 5.30 p.m. and our switchboard was closing down — I don't have a personal phone —and I suggested that I ring Kevin Moseley at home.

"I'm sorry," came the reply. "We don't give our journalists home numbers, they don't like being bothered at home!"

Well, that was enough for me! I almost fell off my chair laughing because if anyone is criticised for not being contactable at home, it's me and here is a journalist cut off from the outside world.

What amused me more than anything else is that I would have thought it was every journalist's job to listen to anyone who wanted to talk to him in order to get his news.

It's the equivalent of me refusing to watch a young player and too daft for words . . . but then so was his story!

Who's first? The Mirror, of course

YOU read it in the Mirror on January 30 . . . how the FA were changing the England shirts, made by Admiral, and upsetting parents of Soccer-mad boys. Daily Express readers had to wait until yesterday—three weeks later—when their paper claimed to be "the first to bring you a controversial sport story."

GEAR CHANGE

TOP CLUBS Manchester United, Nottingham Forest and Tottenham will follow England's lead and change their football gear.

Admiral, the sportswear firm criticised for changing England's traditional kit and accused of exploiting the children's market, will announce their latest coup soon.

The Football Association defended their decision to "Go British" last night, while Admiral declared they had put £1 million into football in the last six years.

FA secretary Ted Croker said: "We're proud to support a British firm. And our five-year contract will become void if Admiral are taken over by a foreign concern."

"It's unrealistic to compare their prices with other kit on the market. Their design is so much more intricate."

It keeps hundreds of people in Leicester, where Admiral are based, in employment.

"And I'd like to remind everyone that the FA are a non-profit-making organisation and every penny we get is ploughed back into football."

Admiral spokesman Terry Harris said: "We gave the retail trade

three months notice we were changing the England strip.

"And children who received it as a present at Christmas probably will have outgrown it by the end of the year."

"We invented this kind of market in 1974 and other companies suddenly realised they had to change their methods."

Major

"We had 25 to 30 clubs at the start, but we've now decided to concentrate on the major ones."

That is why Admiral have given big money deals to the top clubs, handing out around £50,000 to the likes of Manchester United for

the right to design a new strip.

Also the clubs get bonuses—£5,000 for an FA Cup Final appearance . . . £28,000 as winners and £10,000 if the club win the League championship.

Admiral's methods have provoked a fierce war among the sportswear firms, with Adidas, the German firm, now outbidding the British company in cash hand-outs to clubs.

Because some clubs have turned to other firms, there have been rumours that Admiral were in financial difficulty.

But that is hardly born out by their latest deals with England and leading league clubs.

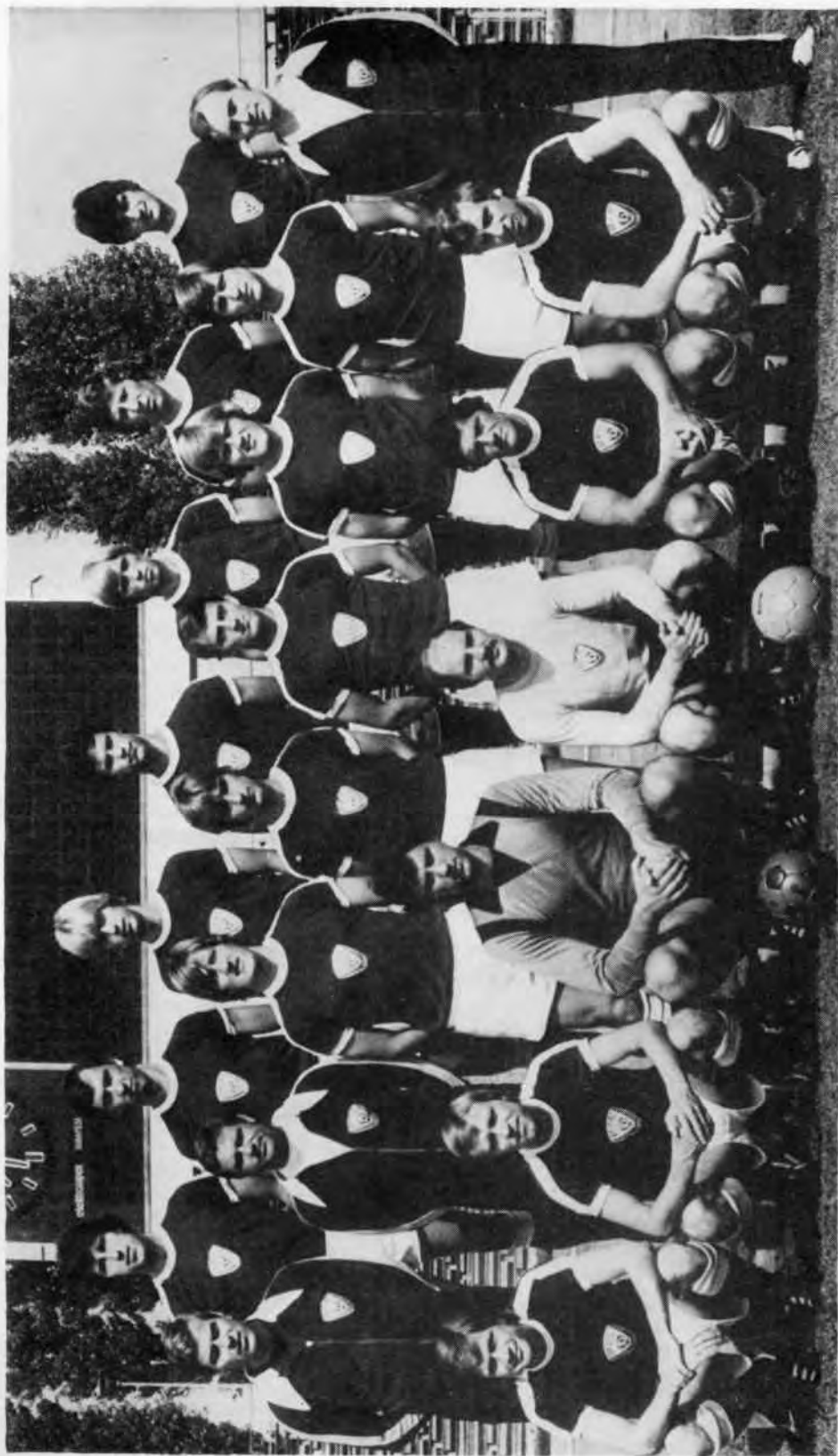

All About Dynamo Berlin

In saying "welcome" tonight for this quarter-final game of the European Cup to our opponents, Dynamo Berlin, we break entirely new ground inasmuch as they are our first opponents in the competition from the German Democratic Republic.

Of course we did play Arges Pitesti in the last round and they, like Dynamo Berlin, are products of the Eastern Bloc countries, but Dynamo are the first German Democratic Republic opposition we have played against in any of our European ties.

The GDR Oberliga took a break just before Christmas when, because of the severe winters experienced in that part of the world, pitches are mainly out of action because of snow and heavy frosts. At that stage our visitors were second in the league table with 20 points from 13 games and just behind Dynamo Dresden who had two more points from the same number played.

However, they will have been glad about the break for one special reason ... because very early in the season their top striker, Hans-Juergen Riediger was hospitalised following a serious leg injury. They were hopeful that a successful operation and recuperation, together with full fitness, on his return would give them once again the full services of their top scorer. He netted 20 goals last season and, apart from being a key member of their attack, he is also an East German international of great experience.

Indeed he was a member of the national side that, prior to losing 3-2 to Holland in November (and so going out of the European championship), had reached the closing stages of the same competition in which England have qualified for the finals in Italy later this year.

Such was his fine form last season that he was voted one of the ten best players in the country and almost single-handedly won the first-ever league title for our visitors with his goal-scoring feats.

Dynamo Berlin's record in their domestic league competition was incredible for they lost only one game in their 26 match programme! They finished their fixtures seven points in front of their second-placed rivals, Dynamo Dresden, winning

21 games and drawing four. The one loss was at the hands of Magdeburg (1-nil) and it was this side that also beat them in the Cup Final (also by one goal to nil) and so robbed them of a wonderful League and Cup "double".

Magdeburg incidentally were eliminated from the European Cup Winners' Cup this season by Arsenal. At the half-season break the "Oberliga" was headed by Dynamo Dresden (22 points from 13 games) and Berlin were second with 20 points from the same number of games: Magdeburg trailed in fifth position with 16 points.

Because they have a smaller divisional set-up than we in England, then it is easier for the clubs to call a halt until conditions get better. In their first game, on the resumption of their league programme last Saturday, they defeated Karl-Marx-Stadt 3-1, goals being scored by Polka, Schulz, and Netz (all in the second half). Riediger was the substitute and came on in the later stages of the game, so we may see him in action tonight.

Second top scorer for Berlin last season was Wolf Rudiger Netz who netted 16 times and he too is another international for his country whilst the team captain is Frank Terletzki who seems certain to play for the German Democratic Republic team in the Moscow Olympics later this year.

Actually the national side are the Olympic title holders having won the gold medal at the Montreal Games four years ago so that gives some idea of the high standard of play in the League.

Dynamo Berlin have a very young line-up — their average age is only 23 years — and Terletzki is possibly the youngest

skipper of all the teams that have competed in the European Cup this season. He scored what turned out to be the winning goal of their 4-3 aggregate win over Servette Geneva in the last round of the competition.

Their home ground is a compact stadium of 30,000 all-seated, and attendances of that order are commonplace for their matches.

There is a dual managerial-partnership at their club just as there are at several in this country. At the helm is Jürgen Bogs and his assistant is Martin Skaba.

The former said about this tie when the draw was first announced, "No one can predict whether it is an advantage for us to play the first leg in Nottingham. But in our view, as long as we do not go into the second leg with too many goals to make up, the tie on our ground is the decisive one."

In the first round of the competition they beat Polish champions Ruch Chorzow at the Berliners' Friedrich Ludwig Jahn Sportpark (their home stadium) 4-1 and drew the return leg in Poland 0-0 so it does seem to bear out (and especially when you consider their results against Servette in the following round) that ground advantage to them is something they regard as a bonus.

Significantly however — certainly we hope for us — is that no club side from behind the Iron Curtain has ever reached the final of the European Cup (or the Cup Winners' Cup and UEFA competition) and, whilst there's a first time for everything, the conclusion has to be that their teams have the qualities to progress so far but they are not quite ready for a supreme assault in the major contests.

The defeat of Magdeburg in the Cup Winners' Cup by Arsenal for one and the subsequent defeat of Liverpool's conquerors Dynamo Tbilisi in this, the major European competition, is another example of potential threats which have petered out.

But matches against club sides from this part of the continent are largely in the category of a "journey into the unknown" and since from every soccer competition in any sphere, domestic or international, emerges an outsider, the challenge of visiting Dynamo Berlin is not one to be taken lightly.

The formation of the "Oberliga" League — as the Eastern German First Division is known — is relatively new (formed only in 1948) and perhaps gives some clue to their failure thus far to make much progress in the leading European competitions. Most other European nation competitions are considerably older — and have more clubs under the wing of the organising body (East Germany has only 4,900) and, as in most sports, tradition, professionalism and attitude has as much to do with winning trophies as does having excellent players and administration.

But all that is by the way, the important part of the business is now at hand ... the first leg of the Quarter Final of the European Cup and another game in defence of our title ... "Champions of Europe" ... as well as another step, we hope, on our way to retaining the magnificent trophy which will emulate other British clubs (and a few from the continent) who have performed this task with distinction.

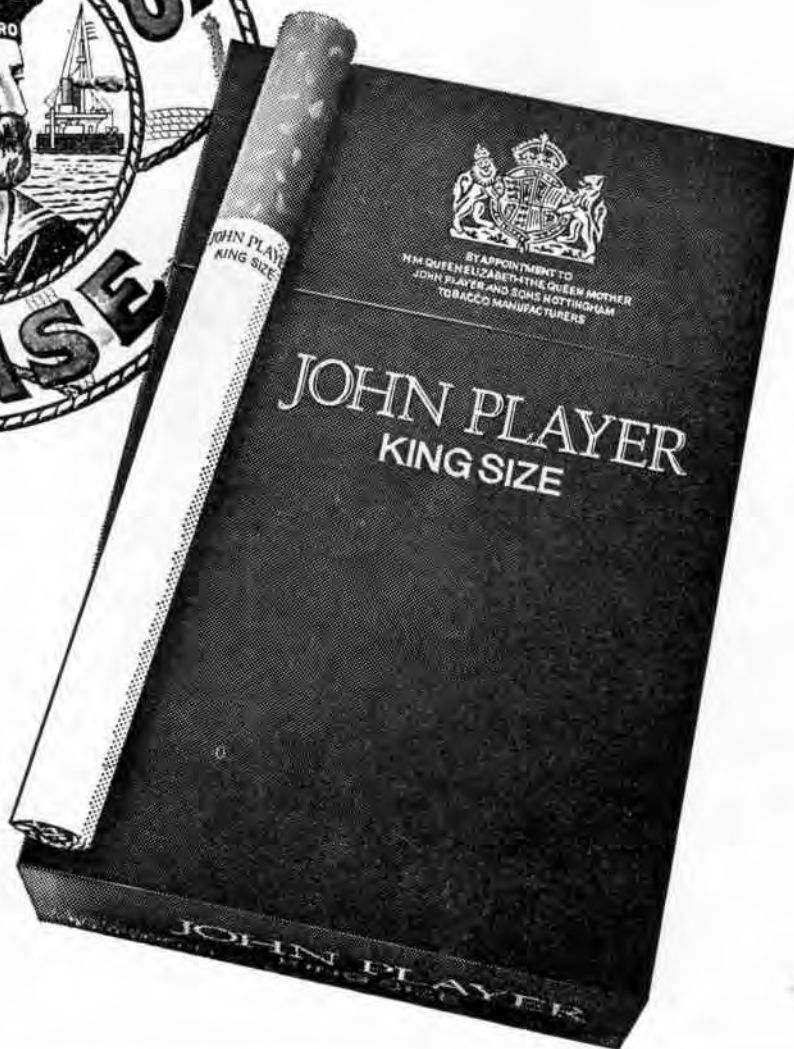

THE SCENE

The Dynamos have made a sensational start to the second half of their season for, a week last Saturday, they defeated Karl-Marx-Stadt 3-1 with goals from Polka, Schulz, and Netz to be followed last Saturday, with an overwhelming 9-1 win over Stahl-Riesa. 4-0 at half-time, they added another five in the second half.

The sharpshooters in this massacre were Pelka (4), Terletzki (2), Riediger, Strasser, and Lauck.



A new record was set up in December 1978 in East Germany by Dynamo Berlin who won their first eight matches, a feat never achieved before.



22-year-old Nikolai Vassilijev scored five goals for Torpedo Moscow in the 6-2 home win over Pachtakor Taschkent. This was only the fourth time since the USSR League began in 1936 that a player had scored five. The first was Schelagin of the now defunct Spartak Leningrad in 1938, and the most recent was Gavaschvili of Dynamo Tbilisi in 1968.



East Germans Champions-elect Dynamo Berlin played West Germany's 1.FC Kaiserslautern in a friendly recently and Lutz Eigendorf asked for political asylum. Normally, players have to wait 12 months before they can play for a West German club in such circumstances, but Kaiserslautern have offered Dynamo £25,000 in hard German currency. Even so, the East Germans are expected to say "nein".

East German Cup winners, 1.FC Magdeburg, fielded an all-international team in the Cup Final. Moreover, ten of the team were former Youth internationals, which suggests that the DDR develops their young talent better than any other country.



Lev Yashin, manager of Dynamo Moscow, reckons Russia have five goalkeepers who could become great: Vladimir Pilgij and Nicholas Gontar of his own team, Vladimir Astapovski the current national team 'keeper, and Yuri Romensky of Dynamo Kiev. The fifth is Yuri Degtarev, recently dropped by national boss Nikita Simonian; he plays for Schachtjor Donezk.



Foreigners are banned from playing in all countries of Eastern Europe—with one notable exception. In East Germany there are 17 Russians playing with Second Division clubs. They are not allowed to play in the Oberliga and not surprisingly they are all serving soldiers in the Russian Army posted to East Germany.



Yuri Ilitchev, a Russian, is the national team manager of Iceland. His contract is worth £15,000 a year, free home, free car and two flights home to Leningrad each month to see his family.



Oleg Blochin of Dynamo Kiev had scored 148 League goals at the start of the Russian season and needed just nine more to beat the record held by Nikita Simonian, current national team-manager. . . . Eberhard Vogel, who is still playing for Carl Zeiss Jena, is East Germany's record scorer with 169 League goals.

The East German magazine "Neue Fussballwoche" has named England as the best national team of 1979. West Germany were rated second and Holland third. And England's European rivals Italy? No better than seventh.



In East Germany football hooligans recently ran into a restaurant and stole food from customers' plates, while reports say that some shops were raided and . . . washing powder stolen!



East German football seems to be in a poor state of health. After Arsenal had beaten Lokomotiv Leipzig very decisively, even winning away, their striker Dieter Kuhn was called up for the European Championship game against Iceland and on the same day Lokomotiv had three men in the Under-21 squad: goalkeeper Rene Muller, midfielder Matthias Liebers and defender Thomas Dennstedt.



East Germany recently turned out their Under-21 team to draw 1-1 with touring North Korea. Manager of North Korea was Pak Do Ik, an inside-left who starred for his country in the 1966 World Cup in England and scored that memorable goal against Italy.



The East German championship resumed on February 23rd with Dynamo Dresden leading from champions Dynamo Berlin. Neither team conceded a penalty at all in the first-half of their programme and for Dynamo Dresden ten of their 34 league goals were scored from headers which is an unusually high percentage for East Germans.

IN EUROPE

Vaclav Jezek, who led Czechoslovakia to success in the 1976 European Championship, has had his contract with Feyenoord extended to June 1981.

Another former manager of the Czech national team, Ladislav Novak, with a record 76 Czech caps, is in Belgium with Royal Antwerp FC and they have extended his contract till June 1980.

Novak's last club was Belgian First Division team SC Lokeren, whom he led into the UEFA Cup, and wanting another Czech coach they took Novak's advice and signed former Dukla inside-right Josef Vacenovsky, who took over in January.



Wolfgang Seguin, of East German Cup winners 1.FC Magdeburg, has played 344 League matches for the club including the last eight seasons in a row involving 208 games in succession without missing one.



The best supported Czech team during the first half of their season was Zbrojovka Brno, coached by Josef Masopust. They averaged 23,000 for home games.



Streich, the Dynamo Dresden striker, scored the only goal in an international fixture between Spain and East Germany on 13th February.



The new Russian national team boss is also in charge of their Olympics soccer squad. He took them to Italy last month where they trained and played against several club sides.

Moscow Spartak are Russian champions for the first time in 10 years. They made sure on the last day of the season, winning 3-2 away in Rostov, despite being reduced to 10 men by injuries to goalkeeper Dassayev and centre-back Khidiatulin.

Sergei Andreyev was Spartak's top scorer with 17 goals—enough to make him second overall in the goals table, alongside Kiev's Oleg Blokhin and behind Shakhtar Donetsk's Vitaly Staroukhin (25).



Hungary have used no fewer than 43 players in eight internationals this year—and that's not counting the Olympic qualifying matches, for which manager Karoly Lakat has decided to place his faith in a block selection from UEFA Cup surprises Diosgyoer Miskolc.



Georg Buschner, the East German team manager, recently notched his 100th international with the 5-2 win over Switzerland. He took the DDR to the World Cup in 1974 for the first time and won the Gold Medal at the Montreal Olympics. Buschner is one of the longest-serving managers in world football.

Sarajevo, leaders in Yugoslavia at the start of the Spring campaign, have an entire team of home-based players who all came up from the club's Youth teams. This includes inside-forward Safet Susic, first capped last year, who hit two hat-tricks for Yugoslavia and recently earned the Footballer of the Year award.



The winter break in East Germany was shortened this season from December 12th to February 23rd in anticipation that they would want to finish their programme early to take part in the European Championship Finals. Though those hopes are dashed, it meant that their champions BFC Dynamo Berlin had two League games and an FA Cup tie behind them before their European Cup game here tonight.



Jacek Gmoch, former boss of Poland's national team, has followed his predecessor Kazimierz Gorski to Greece. Gmoch has taken over as manager of First Division club Yannina.



The USSR FA is considering a new formula for their Championship which starts in April. The new project calls for two groups of 16 clubs in the top class, and after completion of the programme, play-offs between the top four from each section.



The Polish FA has announced that following Poland's failure to qualify in the European Championship, their First Division will be reduced from 16 clubs to 14 for season 1981-82, in order to allow their national team more time to train together.

As to any change, I would much prefer the present compact format and content, and would not readily support any major alteration. It is a good programme and the price is right too.
